Three months on from the establishment of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, is it really taking actions that are satisfactory to the general population? We will consider this as we compare the current regulatory situation in Japan and regulatory frameworks in various other countries.

Basic policy is now being drawn up on the 'Act on the Protection and Support for the Children and other Victims of TEPCO Disaster', which is also being called the 'Japanese Chernobyl Act'. While drawing lessons from the experience of Chernobyl, we will consider what kind of support will be necessary in Japan.	The effort of women will also be needed in order to eliminate the use of nuclear power. In surveys, it has been found that many more women are in favour of its elimination than men. Yet, little hope is placed in the Diet or elections, and demonstrations are seen as being unconnected to the political process. In this session we will discuss how to link this day-to-day confusion to politics. * There will also be a viewing of Obuchi Mari's film "Fukushima & Minamata Rescuers," courtesy of the Auschwitz Peace Museum Japan.
